EXHIBITOR'S RULES & REGULATIONS

Please READ CAREFULLY; the rules and regulations will be strictly enforced.

GENERAL RULES:

Entries accepted between 2:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. on Wednesday of Fair week.

All judging will commence at 9:00 a.m. the following morning.

The exhibition will be open to the public on Friday.

All exhibits except livestock must stay on the grounds until Monday unless removal is authorized. Exhibits are to be picked up between 2pm and 8pm on Monday.

Entry fees are \$5 per exhibitor and \$1 per student. This entry fee provides you membership in the Stanley Agricultural Society for one year.

OTHER RULES AND REGULATIONS:

All entries must be listed on the printed forms found in the middle of exhibitor's guide, which can be picked up at the Stanley Community Library, Stanley Adult Learning Centre, Johnstone's Pharmachoice, Taymouth Community Centre or Capital Credit Union. These forms must be filled in and signed by the exhibitor and presented to the attendant on Wednesday evening by 9:00 p.m.

Entry forms must contain a correct list of the animals or articles intended to be exhibited.

The exhibitor must have personally produced the items.

Every item must have a tag attached, to identify it by section, class and exhibitors number.

No exhibitor shall be allowed to enter the same article in more than one section, or class; only one entry per person per class or subclass.

Any exhibitor wishing to sell any article may attach a price tag.

Safety of Exhibits: Although the Agricultural Society will take reasonable precautions to ensure the safety and security of articles exhibited, it must be understood that the owners (exhibitors) must assume all risk. Should any article be stolen, damaged or lost, the Agricultural Society will do everything in its power to recover such article. However, no payment will be made for its replacement.

Exhibitors are not allowed to be present during judging. Exhibitors are not to remove or interfere with exhibits after placed in position, unless given permission by Fair personnel, or before close of show, including during judging.

The judges are requested to make entries at the end of their books, before handing in to the secretary's office. The Society welcomes suggestions that may improve the prize list.

All charges for space, privileges, and concessions must be paid at the opening of the exhibition. Rental space is available for anyone interested in a sale table, etc.

Any articles or fixtures are left in the building at the owners' risk.

Only those authorized by the Agricultural Society shall offer for sale any drinks, wares, merchandise, or refreshments of any kind on the grounds or in the buildings.

Exhibitors of animals, machinery in motion or other exhibits liable to cause injury or damage to persons coming in contact with them shall guard their exhibit and protect the public from injury. The Society will not be responsible for any claims, demands, costs, charges and expenses resulting from non-compliance.

NOTE: The Society will not hold itself responsible for any printed or other errors in the Prize List. Such errors will be ruled by context, should they occur.

AGRICULTURE

Section 9: Eggs

All eggs are to be Grade A which must comply with the following specifications:

- A. Quality factor: Yolk outlining indistinct; yolk round in shape and reasonably centered, showing no germ development or readily visible defects or abnormal conditions, air cells, blood spots and meat are not permitted
- B. Shell factor: Shell shall not be broken and normal in shape: slightly rigid or rough areas or slightly misshapen shells are permitted; but definitely misshapen heavily rigid or thin shells prohibited; the shell must be clean, but may show three stain spots, none of which shall exceed an area of 1/8 X 1/16 inch.
- C. Weight factor: Grade A large size shall weigh individually at the rate of 24 ounce per dozen or over. Grade A small size shall weigh individually at the rate of 18 ounces per dozen.

Grain

- A. All grain must be the growth of the current year.
- B. The names of different varieties of wheat, oats and other seed and grain must be inserted by exhibitors in their entries
- C. The roots must be certified as a field culture by the exhibitor except potatoes which are open to all.
- D. The exhibitor must certify that samples have not been exhibited and have been grown by themselves.

House Hold Science

- 1) Food must be exhibited in CLEAR PLASTIC BAGS ONLY. *"Zip Loc" bags preferred. Plastic wrap will not be accepted.
- 2) All cakes to be baked in a square pan, the entry being one corner of the cake, 5 inches square, excluding decorated cakes.
- 3) Preserves, jam and pickles must be vacuum-sealed in standard canning jars or they will not be judged.
- 4) Please put your complete mailing address and telephone number on entry forms, for purpose of awarding prize.
- 5) Exhibitors are limited to one entry per class.

NOTE: Winner of the Most 1st place prizes in cooking and preserving will receive The Stanley Fair Homemaker's Award which is to be presented at the Opening Dinner.

We invite all entrants to help support the Stanley Fair by donating a sample of their exhibit (e.g. Portion of cake, loaf of bread, jar of jam, or any other item) to a sale table on site. The public has expressed much interest in purchasing the delicious products they see.

House Hold Science

Hints for cooking:

1. Do not package baking while warm.
2. Appearance is important. This includes colour, shape and uniform size.
3. Display only number or quantity called for.
4. All baked goods must be placed in plastic bags with tags securely taped on.
5. Attach tags to jars with rubber bands or strings. (No Tape)
6. All bread should be made in standard pans (5"x9") and cut in half

Hints for Fancy Work:

1. Sale of displayed articles will be allowed, provided they are not removed before the end of the exhibition.
2. Articles soiled or defective are not eligible for competition.
3. All articles must be the work of the person exhibiting.
4. Articles must not have been exhibited at previous Stanley Fairs.
5. Club entries will be accepted and judged as a group exhibit.

Hints for Sewing:

1. General appearance is very important - articles should be clean and well pressed.
2. Sewing techniques are examined, e.g.. Zippers, hems, sleeves, and seam finishes.

Hints for Knitting / Crocheting:

1. Evenness of stitches is very important.
2. There should be no loose ends showing.
3. Joining seams should not be too tight or loose- flat, soft seams are preferred.

Hints for Needlework:

1. Any type of needlework should be well finished on the reverse side.
2. There should be no knots or loose threads.
3. Entries should have reverse side visible for judging.
4. Special consideration will be given to needle crafts, which are traditionally presented framed under glass or encased, e.g. petit point.

Hints for Quilting:

1. Binding should be attached with the same color thread throughout.
2. In pieced quilts, the corners should meet so that no seam stitches show.
3. If plain binding - properly mitered corners will be given extra consideration.
4. Check quilt to see that no quilting is missed.
